

ECUADOR SCENIC

9-Day Tour in the Andes



Discover the heart of mainland Ecuador!

Full of colonial charm, indigenous traditions, and endless moorland scenery straight out of a magical tale, the Ecuadorian Andes offer a spectacular multi-day adventure for you to explore the essential aspects of the country's nature, culture, and history. This is Ecuador at its best: diverse, hospitable, and welcoming.



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Day 2: The Highlights of Quito (B/L/-)

Begin your journey in Quito's well-preserved historic district, where colorful buildings, cobblestone streets, and intricate churches await. Explore the *Plaza de la Independencia* and observe the combination of colonial, European, and indigenous art.



Continue to *La Virgen del Panecillo* viewpoint for breathtaking views of Quito's domes, towers, and surrounding mountains. Next, experience the *Middle of the World* at 0 degrees latitude. Discover the origins of Ecuador's name and the Geodesic Mission's contribution to measuring the planet.



Day 1: Welcome to Ecuador (-/-/-)

Surrounded by mountains, the city of Quito warmly welcomes you to start a fantastic adventure. You will be met at the airport upon your arrival and transported to your hotel.



Visit two iconic sites in this area: *La Compañía de Jesús* with its exquisite Baroque altar and gold leaf ornaments; *San Francisco*, Quito's first church with an impressive colonial art collection; or the *Basílica del Voto Nacional* with its neo-Gothic architecture & local animal gargoyles.





Visit the Ethnographic Museum inside the monument, and the nearby Intiñan Museum offers insights into the "true" middle of the world as defined by the Inca civilization confirmed and by modern technology. Return to your hotel at the end of the tour.



Day 3: Exploring Otavalo's Andean Heritage (B/L/-)

Start this day's adventure with a scenic drive, stopping first in Guayllabamba to sample the exotic Chirimoya fruit. Continue to Cayambe, where you'll enjoy views of the Cayambe Volcano and large flower plantations. In Cayambe, taste the traditional Bizcochos, a buttery pastry paired with special leaf-wrapped cheese.



Arrive at San Pablo Lake, with the majestic Imbabura volcano as your backdrop, perfect for capturing stunning Andean scenery. Next, explore Otavalo's vibrant market, where you can buy unique souvenirs and soak in the local culture.



In Peguche, visit an artisan workshop to learn about traditional tapestry-making from skilled locals. Enjoy a delightful lunch at a local venue before heading to Cuicocha crater lake, with its impressive depth and two lava islands. This cultural and natural wonder offers breathtaking photo opportunities. On the way back, pass by Cotacachi, a charming town known for its leather goods and quaint plazas. After a day full of activities, return to your hotel in Quito.







Day 4: Cotopaxi & Rose Plantation (-/L/-)

Embark on this volcanic journey, heading south from Quito, with a first stop at a traditional open market that offers great insights into Andean cuisine and its rich cultural heritage.

Upon arrival at the Cotopaxi National Park, diverse experiences await:

Limpiopungo lake offers a magnificent Andean experience. A walk around the lake and grounds, may grace you with sightings of local wildlife.*

Cotopaxi's first basecamp (located at 16,400 feet) features a rewarding panoramic view after an invigorating hike of about 1,500 feet.

The Inca ruins of **Pucará Del Salitre**, a strategically built 15th century military fortress, offer a stunning view of the highlands plateau and the surrounding Andes.*

Cueva de los Buhos (Owls Cave), a geological fault believed to have formed after an eruption, is home to two owl species, eagles and other wildlife.*

To end this wonderful day of discovery, you will learn about the significance of Ecuador's rose industry at a blooming local plantation.









Day 5: Quilotoa Crater Lake & Tigua Workshop (B/L/-)

A scenic drive through the central Andes takes you to Quilotoa, where you will admire the incredible, turquoisecolored lake inside the volcano's caldera. Enjoy the ever-changing water's color, perfectly contrasting with the breathtaking Sierra views and peaks.



Day 6: Baños: Waterfalls & Scenic Views (B/L/-)

Today you will visit two impressive waterfalls in the region: the awe-inspiring Devil's Cauldron and the beautiful Mantle of the Bride (Pailón del Diablo & Manto de la Novia).




There are three options to explore the breathtaking scenery of Quilotoa:

- Traditional Viewpoint: An easy 20-minute hike.
- Shalala Viewpoint: An active hike of approximately one hour.
- Lake-Shore Hike: A strenuous 2-hour trek.

Later, visit the Tigua art gallery and workshop, renowned for vibrant wood masks and intricate paintings on sheepskin, depicting everyday life scenes. Spend time admiring and shopping for these unique artworks before continuing the journey towards Baños.







Next, a fantastic vantage point allows you to admire the lush valley and hills, framed by the majestic Tungurahua volcano. *Mano de la Pachamama* (Mother's nature hand) is a remarkable monument that emerges from the mountains, and nearby, you will find the iconic "swing at the end of the world".

Enjoy some exploration in Baños' charming streets, where you can visit local souvenir shops and indulge in tasting delightful 'melcocha'—a taffy-like treat handmade from whole cane sugar. At the end of the day, continue your journey south towards Riobamba.

Day 7: History en-route: Inca Fortress, First built church & Beyond (B/L/-)

The adventure continues southward through quaint indigenous villages, offering insights into the region's historical significance.





The first stop of the day is on the outskirts of Riobamba. La Balbanera, built in 1534, is Ecuador's first Catholic church. Though relatively small, it endures with its original stone facade. Nearby lies Laguna de Colta, a picturesque lake surrounded by traditional indigenous structures and homes, offering a glimpse into local life.

Continuing through the southern Andes, your next destination is Ingapirca, Ecuador's largest Incan ruins. This Inca fortress was built atop a Cañari civilization adoration site, revealing the intriguing blend of both cultures before Spanish colonization.



Day 8: Cuenca, the gem of southern Ecuador (B/L/-)

A visit to the remarkable city of Cuenca awaits today!

Discover how ancient traditions persist amidst modernity in the third-largest city in Ecuador, a UNESCO World Heritage site.





Mestizo, expats and indigenous locals stroll through its beautifully maintained historic district, where colonial architecture harmoniously blends with modern structures and natural surroundings, such as the Inca complex of Pumapungo, visible from both near and far. With a rich cultural background, the city offers numerous modern art and precolonialism exhibitions in its galleries and museums.

Enjoy stunning viewpoints of the city's terracotta roofs and the blue domes of the Cathedral, walk along evergreen river trails, and partake in a fascinating tour of a "Panama" hat workshop and museum—a fantastic opportunity to acquire this unique Ecuadorian souvenir.

Day 9: Paramo, Moorlands & Cacao (B/L/-)

Today, you will embark on a remarkable road trip from the highlands of the Sierra to the modern city of Guayaquil, making the most of your journey towards the port city.

Located west of Cuenca, the Cajas National Park offers a wonderful opportunity to explore its captivating moorlands, wetlands, hundreds of lakes, and its Polylepis tree forest. Capture stunning photographs of the breathtaking vistas of the mountains shaping the western Andes.







Continuing the journey towards the Coastal region, you'll enjoy an immersive experience on a traditional local family farm. Specializing in cacao cultivation, this location provides a fascinating insight into the process of turning cacao into world-renowned Ecuadorian chocolate! As you explore the farm, marvel at the abundance of fruit trees such as mango, banana, plantain, and more.

After a tasty lunch, the road trip to Guayaquil continues. Hotel drop-off and end of our services.
